MINUTES OF THE ENFORCEMENT COMMITTEE MEETING HELD ON May 14, 2015

The Enforcement Committee convened at 11:25 a.m.

Committee Chair Feldman opened the meeting at 11:25 a.m.

John Burth, Environmental Program Specialist 2, presented a report on the current process enforcement staff use to investigate and resolve potential violations.

Mr. Burth presented the common ways staff become aware of potential violations, including reports from the public, staff observations, review of Salesweb, referrals from other agencies and self-reporting through review of JIFs or Project applications.

Mr. Burth reviewed the steps of the investigation process including an initial review, contacting the landowner, site visits, resolving violations by voluntary compliance or settlement agreements, and when it is necessary to file settlement agreements in county clerk's office and/or seek civil penalties.

Mr. Burth discussed the five most common types of alleged violations addressed by the Enforcement Program in 2014, and reviewed the outcomes of actual cases. These types of cases include wetlands, subdivisions, shoreline structure setback, shoreline cutting, and permit violations. Mr. Burth also reviewed Salesweb, the database used by staff to monitor new subdivisions as they occur in the Park.
